OFF CAMPUS: EYES WIDE OPEN

The multimedia exhibit, **Eyes Wide Open**, mounted by the American Friends Service Committee, takes visitors on a journey through the words, images, and sounds of the Iraq war. A particularly memorable piece features more than 950 boots representing U.S. soldiers killed in Iraq alongside shoes representing Iraqi deaths. The exhibit speaks directly to viewers' hearts and minds, shattering the claim that the war has made America safer and challenging us to confront our fears and let our dreams, not our nightmares, shape our collective future.

Tens of thousands have seen the exhibit this summer as it traveled from Philadelphia, throughout New England, and on to Boston and, later, New York City, to be shown in juxtaposition to both the Democratic and Republican National Conventions. **Rod Nippert**, of the local group People for Peace & Justice, would like to organize a group tour to see **Eyes Wide Open** on either September 25 or 26 while it is in Dayton. 5) REPORT FROM NICARAGUA:

Continuing our long tradition of offering socially responsible travel experiences for students, UCM organized a two-week trip to Nicaragua in August to learn about the impact of U.S. policy and globalization on women's lives. Our tour group was composed of students and faculty from Ohio University and Hamilton College in New York, as well as three retired/activist women from Columbus, New Hampshire, and Pennsylvania. Our host was Witness for Peace, a United States-based non-profit organization with a 22-year history of working for a more just American foreign policy in Nicaragua.

The Nicaraguan people are among the poorest in the Western Hemisphere and their lives are directly affected by the burden of their government's large international debt. Since the end of the Contra war in 1990, WFP has brought delegations to this Central-American nation to witness and document the impact of neo-liberal economic policies on the people of Nicaragua. The hope is that WFP delegates will return to the States armed with the knowledge and the tools needed to change these policies through community education, activism and lobbying.

Currently, the threat of the Central America Free Trade Agreement (CAFTA - similar to NAFTA) looms large in the region, and most popular movements and civil society organizations in Nicaragua oppose its passage. The groups and individuals we met with argued, among other things, that CAFTA will have a devastating effect on small-scale agriculture and small business and industry. Nicaraguan farmers told us again and again that they are unable to compete with U.S. agricultural imports and that their way of life, along with their food security and the welfare of their families, will be jeopardized if CAFTA passes.

Nicaraguans are also concerned with structural adjustment policies that encourage the privatization of water and other public services. Dona Miriam, a community organizer and *campesina* (small farmer) in El Regadio, told us, "We can't allow water, which is our life, to be privatized. CAFTA will be catastrophic for us, the poor." Ruth Selma Herrera of the Nicaraguan National Consumers' Defense Network summed it up, "If CAFTA goes into effect, it will not only deepen the levels of poverty in my country, but will make us slaves of the giant U.S. multinational corporations, provoking profound discontent."

Poor Nicaraguan women and their families are particularly vulnerable to neo-liberal economic policies, so-called "free trade," structural adjustment, and Nicaragua's \$6 billion debt burden. Women are, without question, the backbone of Nicaraguan society and are working hard, organizing their communities, and fighting for the livelihoods of their families. A *maquila* (a facility producing garments for export) worker, 80% of whom are women supporting their families on less than \$2.50 a day, said of her situation, "Employment, yes! But with dignity!"

Pressure is building to bring CAFTA before Congress during the so-called "lame duck" session after the November elections, before the new Congressional members take their seats in January. We need to urge Congress to vote no on CAFTA. For more information on CAFTA, visit www.nicanet.org and www.stopcafta.org.
